#### **Background**



Medical students are at higher risk for mental illness and suicide, but unfortunately, many current risk reduction strategies are inadequate.



The Medical College of Wisconsin (MCW) created an interdisciplinary Suicide Prevention Council (SPC) to develop solutions tailored to the unique needs of the medical education community.



The SPC along with student leads on the MCW Central Wisconsin (CW) campus developed Seeking Peer Outreach\* (SPO\*) to target key risk factors of stigma and isolation.

#### Conclusions

- Events and monthly small group meetings have helped foster personal growth for students and community trust
- Involving the entire campus emphasizes that community wellness is a group effort
- Emphasis on peer participation allows for support from people who understand the challenges of medical education
- Early pilot data is promising, but it will take time to properly assess impact

#### **Future Directions**

- > Enhancing accessibility with an anonymous support platform
- Evaluating program outreach efficacy and utility of Tier 2 training
- Evaluating program impacts on risk factors of stigma and isolation
- Integration into the rest of the MCW system
- Growing to encompass other wellness initiatives, mental health services, and professional identity formation objectives


#### **Methods**



#### Sample SPO\* Team Pledge

- No judgement. Be open when talking to peers, and don't judge them, the situation or problem.
- Assume the best in one another.
- Be observant, look for signs in peers. Don't always assume everyone is okay.
- Everyone matters and is important. Take care of yourself.
- Be aware of what resources are available to you and peers.
- The main goal is to support one another, not compete with one another.
- When in doubt reach out! Just because you may be the support person for another, doesn't mean that you can't also ask for help.
- Make time for who and what is important to you.
- Don't be too hard on yourselves. Remember to give yourself grace.
